









8. Have you ever followed up with people who you met for the first time at ESIP after the meeting?









1	It would have been more valuable if everyone had used it to check in. I liked to see where people where checked in. Much more reasonable than going to a google doc or signing a piece of paper. I did use it to quickly see what sessions were available at a given time to make sure I was in the right place.
1	There is not enough description on the sessions. You know ahead of time who is speaking and their topic but that was not included so it did not provide enough detail to make decisions about which I would attend.
1	I had planned the sessions I'd attend in advance, so I didn't need the app - but I had downloaded it to participate in some of the 'checking-in' features and other community-building endeavors.
1	I was able to quickly get information about where a session I wanted to attend was, and also check on the time it was scheduled.
1	One issue with the app is that it doesn't provide enough information. For example, for the Federal Big Data Plenary it only listed the speaker from IBM and provided no description of the session. This was true of other sessions as well.
1	It was really helpful to have the schedule and the session locations readily available on the phone.



It would be nice to have (1) larger breakout rooms, (2) more than one drink ticket at the poster/networking session, (3) free parking for attendees at the hotel. 1 All plenary speakers should be well aware of the ESIP community participants and related disciplines. 1 Make it easier for new members to get up to speed. ESIP 101 is great, but it needs to be more personal with more dialog than (one to many) ppts. 1 Break-out rooms were too small. Often, folks arriving late had to sit on the floor. Some rooms were too warm (e.g., McKinley 1 1) Soliciting more Earth Scientists for attending the ESIP meetings if possible. As an Earth scientist myself, I fully understand it won't be an easy effort/task, but I truly believe such a substantial "Data & Science" interaction is crucial and critical for helping ESIP achieving its goals. 2) Because of "1)", ESIP may consider inviting few fine Earth scientists (especially for those who are also experienced data producers/providers) as the future keynote speakers to address the "Big Data" matters/issues from their perspectives or/and needs. Thanks. 1 Hard to say - Perhaps fewer breakout sessions so that the chance for conflicting interests are lessened. 1 Please try to keep to the time allotted for sessions and offer the breakout sessions more than once during the conference. 1 Some of the breakout rooms were overflowing with standing room only crowds. It's impossible to anticipate and afford enough space for everybody to see everything, but it seems like it's time to up the estimate for the number of folks that might want to attend any single breakout session. 1 My colleague sat in the back of the main plenary room one day, and had difficulty hearing the presenters, so more robust sound should be investigated. Also, maybe an activity to facilitate collaborations throughout the year by identifying attendees who are physically located near one another, and maybe also related events of interest that might be near them. 1 I think 5 concurrent session tracks creates too many conflicts. I would try to get it down to 3. Also please ask the CDF folks not to schedule their meeting in competition with ESIP, in the future. 1 The plenary sessions went over time a few times which was quite problemmatic for sessions following. It would be very helpful if all sessions stayed with the time allotted. the google doc method used to track attendance seemed prone to error. If one was unable to view the paper notice than 1 attendance tracking was not possible. 1 More non-traditional session types. For example, encourage "no presentations" sessions where it is all (or mostly) discussion. Sessions where people talk to each other rather than being talked at are often the most productive. 1 Planning meetings were sometimes rather painful, especially for people who were new and did not know the acronyms and history and goals. Some asked for introductions but it would have been useful if that had been standard. 1 Some of the breakout rooms were a little cramped for the crowds that attended. Perhaps it would be good for attendees to sign up ahead of time? 1 Keep on being awesome! Would love to maybe have some sort of overview before the meeting maybe sort of a "These are the groups that will have representatives at the meeting" - to help with connections and understanding of the groups?


- 1 Some sessions were too large for the room while others were too small. Plenary was too overcrowded.
