
3. What were your objectives for attending the Federation meeting? (check all that apply)



9. Have you ever followed up with people who you met for the first time at ESIP after the meeting?





1	Good to have plenty of time in breaks/lunch to talk
1	Great meeting, location and discussion! Go ESIP!
1	I participated remotely and could not hear at all, which was a barrier to networking.
1	Introduce newcomers to email lists of clusters or committees
1	Look forward to seeing what others say.
1	Venue worked well this year. Lots of free/open spaces for folks to meet and chat.
1	I know that we were constrained by the dinner time of the venue, but in the future a longer poster session would help to improve my networking experience.
1	At the AAS conference I attended this winter, there was a reception that started with a keynote. The speaker (don't remember the name) introduced several concepts or topics under an overarching theme. He then introduced key people who would be leading deeper discussions around each topic. Each of those leaders had a space in the room with flip charts and pens for brainstorming. Participants mingled, gathering around the groups that interested them. It was sort of like round table discussions, except standing up, cocktail party style, and all the smaller discussions centered around the central theme of the keynote. Good opportunity to network. There was also an abundance of finger foods and free drinks, provided by one of the meeting sponsors. Food + drinks + something interesting to talk about = great networking!
1	Allow individuals to set up an ESIP-appropriate online profile describing their research interests and other relevant information (pointers to other webpages such as LinkedIn profile or publications). People can look at these in advance of the meeting and plan with whom they would like to network.
1	I liked the QR scans for networking. I think that could be expanded so attendees can create a virtual roll-a-deck. It should be introduced at the start and included at each poster.
1	Question 8 might be easier to answer if it were a more qualitative scale (e.g. one-or-two, several, many). Since a lot of collaborative leads are nebulous
1	I think choosing the right venue is important. Though Asilomar was beautiful, it was hard to meet and network with people who were not attending the same events, since everything was located so far apart. Meals in the common dining hall were nice, but I still only met people sitting at my same table.
1	It might be cool to have a list of twitter handles of esip people put on the main site. people were big on tweeting there, and that's a low-effort way to keep in touch.
1	I don't see any definition of "collaboration" in the survey. But seriously, just providing the attendee list gives me enough information to contact the people I made contact with.
1	I thought the scanner networking app was really cool but I didn't see many people using it. I can see where people might feel weird scanning each other with an iphone, so I wonder if it needs some more marketing. The way I see it is people should think of it as handing someone your business card.
1	For me the meeting is an important place to meet people, but that importance is really in context with other meetings (EarthCube, AGU, e.g.) and it's the combination that matters, not one or the other.
1	I have thoughts about potential ways to solicit Networking / Collaboration (for those who want to participate) - something like a "Speed Dating" type set up but for discussing potential collaborations? Happy to talk more about this idea and the way I could see it being useful!

Count	Response
1	Proposing collaborations for individuals sounds very complex and onerous, and would need to be done carefully. It feels as though such an activity may be on the fringe of what ESIP should be providing as support to its community.
1	I can't see the definition of 'collaboration' any more, so cannot answer 7 or 8. Collaboration (at least my definition) is very specific, and depends as much on personality as it does on common skills or mandates. Often introductions are very general, so may not pan out in the end.
1	Questions 9 & 11 aren't well formed. #11 could be multi-select choices not just single-selection, and my response to #9 falls between "good" and "awful". Thanks for considering all these ways to help improve networking!
1	Do the Scanning and poster sessions first day!! Don't wait until MidWeek or later for main social events.
1	While structured lunch discussions are usually interesting, it takes away from the organic networking opportunities. I would prefer no more than one of these per meeting.
1	I would like to see a "hacking" type event that combines engineers, designers, and scientists in trying to solve an earth science data problem in a short period of time. This would be great for networking and forcing people to interact. It would also help the various groups understand that other groups problems.
1	networking tends to happen spontaneously, and so the more opportunities for spontaneous networking, the better
1	I thought the way meals were done at the Summer Meeting was fantastic. This allowed me to easily find people for follow-up conversations, while also meeting someone new. A lot of good collaborator/networking happened at meals for me. Also, for first-timers I think the meal-together strategy takes off the awkward pressure of what to do for meals, how to get invited, where to go, etc. And the food was delicious!

missing piece)



1	When it worked, it was great. However it still has bugs. It didn't do well with the network going on and off and prior to the meeting an update removed all the saved sessions I was going to visit. The beacon checkin was cool when it worked, I would recommend eddystone for future meetings (more open)
1	I could not enable the beacon feature to work. Also didn't know about it until half way through the meeting likewise with the networking QR code tool- it was too late to connect by the time I was aware of it and figured it all out.
1	No problems really. If possible maybe more dynamic in updating session descriptions and related content, but okay as it is
1	I was using the Android version and had trouble finding which rooms the sessions were in. I had to revert to the paper schedule.
1	The app seemed to be updating a lot, almost every day. This wasn't a problem so much as a minor inconvenience. If this was due to scheduling changes/updates, that makes sense, but otherwise I wasn't sure why so many updates were needed.
1	No problem, but it would be very nice if it had an alarm to let us know that we a session we marked to attend was about to start. (If it has this capability, I did not see it)
1	An simple online map (just an image, not anything like google maps or anything) of the location of the meeting (especially a location as large as this site) would have been nice.

1	The beacon check-in didn't work at all the rooms, and for the rooms it did, would send repeated notices throughout a session.
1	After viewing the details of a session the app would scroll to the top of the day. This was incredibly annoying as I would like to view all the details of the sessions on a particular day involved constantly scrolling back to the same position. This should have been seen as a problem during testing. Not enough of the sessions contained details. There should be more details about subspeakers and content. For example an acronym that I wasn't familiar with was used as the title for a session. The only description of the session was that same acronym.
1	Would have liked to see the session _locations_ without need to drill down so far. Would have liked the schedule scroll to persist—after drilling down—rather than always returning to the 1st AM session.
1	Setup / login was very confusing, since app credentials had to be setup separately from esip credentials.
1	Somehow when it was first installed I somehow prevented it from using the beacons. I tried following all of the instructions but it never worked. So I had to check in with the paper sign-up sheet.
1	The App seemed to use a lot of battery power. One day my phone died after only an hour. Could have been an issue with my phone, but I only had the problem once I installed the app.

27. Were there problems in using the ESIP WebEx, and, if so, can you recommend any changes?

1	Better audio. I could only hear the person closest to the speaker.
1	It worked out in the end, but I felt very invisible for a while.

I have one session that I would very much to attend, I cannot hear any voices and have to give up. I have no problems see the slides at webEx. Maybe we can have an additional speaker-phone just for calling in?
1	Speakers did not stay near the microphone so the audio cut out often, making it hard or impossible to follow the presentation. It was not possible to hear or follow the Q&A.
1	Could not connect to my workgroup room. This was very disappointing. I would take this into account for future engagements with ESIP

1	Having some visual cue in the meeting room about the remote participants might help. I've attended a past remote meeting as an iPad at the table. That made it much more interactive.







Count Response the outcomes of the lunch time topics are not well defined and everyone had a different idea of what the topic was about. I found it really uninformative. 1 Keep meeting rooms closer to each other and appropriate in size for the break-out sessions (40 - 60 people) 1 More consistent availability of abstracts for talks. More consistent availability of the presentation material, such as the powerpoints. Video of the talks, similar to how SciPy does it. 1 I need to publish the list of rules for FUNding friday, so we can point folks to them. I thought I had covered them all, but seems situations arise that are gray, so written rules would be good. Also, the lunchtime disaster resilience activity was difficult because it was loud in the cafeteria. Not much we could do about that, but hard to get folks to focus and speak loudly from across the table - might have been better in a smaller group. And a key takeaway for me was the idea of making the Testbed efforts fun - love that idea. 1 There were a lot of presenters that were not actually present at the meeting to give their presentations. Remote directed presentations were no where near as good or valuable as the presentations done in person at the event. In my opinion submissions for presenting at ESIP meetings that are accepted should require that the submitter be at the meeting to present or send an alternate presenter to the meeting to present. 1 A slight shift back to the workshop format where people run sessions that plan activities versus reporting on what has been done. The latter is useful - I thought the work on cloud computing that NASA et al. reported on was very interesting. But, in general, I would have liked more discussions and planning and less PowerPoint about 'my cool web site.' I wasn't necessarily aware of all the social events. I don't use twitter very much. Maybe we can include those on the schedule? 1 I suppose I would like for some people to put more stuff in their descriptions and to add more to the community portal in general. 1 Less fussy wifi - it wasn't hard to connect the first time, but moving back and forth between rooms and networks made it hard to reconnect. 1 We were criticized for going to a "posh resort". A lower cost venue would make this complaint less justified. 1 Try to plan break out rooms better to accommodate the number of attendees. The past couple of meetings have had very popular sessions relegated to very small rooms so many people are standing 1 Facilities (internet access, food) is probably the single largest area that could use improvement. 1 Many of the sessions claim to be "workshop" or "discussions" but typically follow a presentation format with very little time for discussion. Admittedly it can be difficult to get people to engage in a discussion. I believe room layout can help/hurt this. When a room is set up for presentations it does not foster discussion. One of the most engaging sessions I went to had the tables in U shape. It was a smaller session which helped. If we want to encourage discussion, perhaps both the session chairs and the room layout can be steered more towards that format. 1 Everything was pretty great, however, in the future I would suggest not requiring dinner to be eaten in a group. For government contracted employees this made travel reimbursement very interesting since not everyone was able to attend every dinner that they were billed for so some nights people paid for two dinners even though they had one. 1 On the first day, I think a plenary of some sort, even if it's only an hour or so would be helpful to set the tone for the meeting and allow people to see who is there generally, etc. 1 I really would like to see the ability to use presenter tools during my presentations. Because of the webex this isn't possible. Is there a way around this? Have many thoughts, but a lot is from a Student Fellow perspective. 

1	While I like the recent venue, I think it's better to keep us all closer for sake of networking.


32. Would you like to host an ESIP meeting at your institution?

That session should also be earlier in the meeting to allow for more potential networking for those who present. 1 I found the quality of many of the presentations to be very low. The speakers (for the most part) knew their subject area and were good enough at verbally communicating their ideas. The actual visual part of the presentation and the organization of the message was usually very poor. (There were definitely exceptions to this.) I saw way too many slide decks that were composed of nothing but bullets on a series of slides. Presenters should be constructing a slide deck that tells a story with visually interesting and communicative slides. Presentations like this are much more likely to actually communicate ideas and knowledge and to be remembered by the viewer. The way to improve this as conference organizers is to communicate the guidelines for presenters. Then you should also seek out presenters who are good at it. I would also try to get feedback from people attending each session using the app on the quality of the presentations. Then you'll have a better idea which presenters are doing a good job or not. If you set expectations of quality presentations then most presenters will step up and you can weed out the ones who don't do this. 1 Meeting was excellent. Kudos to the organizers.
