

We're outgrowing the poster space. It was difficult to maneuver through and read the posters. The wireless was problematic at this meeting by constantly having to re-authenticate and was weak in a lot of areas. better remote attendance support prior to event, and live contact during. Could not find much information on the meeting site about the remote connection beforehand, I think that would have helped most. Although Erin was very helpful throughout the process. The projector screens were really hard to see. I think it was because there was too much light in conference rooms, especially behind some of the screens. I don't think it was the quality of the projectors. NASA HO no longer lets our participants register for conferences, has a contractor do so after attendance is approved. Don't know about others. But would be helpful to not have ESIP put info in the registration process only, as NASA HQ people at least will not see any such info. Improve audio and visual experience for remote attendees The fact that so many sessions run simultaneously prevented me from participating in some relevant discussions. I am not sure how to go around that and fit it all i the schedule, but perhaps having a time in the schedule to present a summary from all the breaout sessions could v=be a way to get an update at some point. Have people tell you what sessions they will attend and then use that for schedule optimization. Hard to do, but it might be worth a try. Looking forward to the music jam session this summer!:) But besides that - just a lot of Thank You's for excellent coordinating despite the challenges of govt. shutdown in the Fall and freezing travel conditions the week of the meeting still it was so valuable and well-done. Having the attendee directory is great, thanks for that too! Maybe go *green* a bit w/schedules being electronic or at least the larger packet, but I liked having a hard copy of the small schedule. Perhaps offer fewer sessions at the same time, and just have more blocks? It was really tough to decide which sections to attend because of the many concurrent ones. Also, this is probably beyond the organizers' control, but a few posters were duplicates from AGU, and were even presented as such (down to the session IDs from AGU). Given that the ESIP meeting is convened so soon after AGU, it's to be expected that not much "new" information will be presented and that many posters would simply be repackaging of material at AGU. I'm fine with this. But, presenting the same poster at two different meetings, unless the AGU poster is displayed to tell a story about the progression of a project (a very useful technique), should be highly discouraged by the organizers. This is a separate meeting and a separate entry on one's CV, and, as such, a different poster should be presented even if it's similar to the AGU one. At minimum, may I suggest that the organizers quickly peruse the posters as they are uploaded to ensure they aren't duplicates? Maybe move up the poster submission deadline in order to facilitate this? Invite (reach out) more research scientists to participate. "Science" and "Data" are inseparable, so are the professionals who are studying or/and managing them, respectively! May be a information board on how to join ESIP working groups during the poster session. Each group leader can give a 2-min intro during the poster session? I believe things went really well at this meeting, but the technical equipment for the webex (i.e. no in room mics for speakers/guestions) seemed like it would be difficult for those not actually attending. I sympathize with remote participants. It always seems difficult to exchange information with them. It is difficult to make sure that everyone, especially in breakout sessions, speaks into a microphone. Insisting on that will impede free flow of discussions. It might help to have a few extra wireless mikes in the breakout rooms. I think these meetings are very well organized. I have to answer no below - but only b/c we are not able to accommodate people here in Woods hole for the summer meeting. (Summer is the high season on Cape Cod) The transition to the new wiki format for the meeting agenda has been very difficult. A few years ago, it was much easier to get an idea of what was scheduled and when prior to the meeting. It's not clear the difference between esipfed and commons.esipfed. The latter is difficult to navigate and I don't find useful info. Get new laptops - the ESIP laptops could not handle the hotel Internet connection = we were not able to demo products via the Internet but when the last presenter popped his laptop in, viola! the Internet worked, while slow(ish) it worked just fine. Not being able to demo tools was a big disappointment to our session, we were told we had Internet & a presenting laptop but really we didn't, webex made it worse. A different laptop could have solved it, but I didn't realize that until the last presenter in our session. Challenge participating agency leads to help provide some coherence to their overall earth science data and information activities, perhaps with some form of lightening talks or something in the poster session. Keep the number of parallel tracks to 3 or 4. Too much going at once and the right people don't always make the room. 1 The real problem with this meeting is that it has so many interesting sessions, many of which are at the same time. It's too short and too concentrated.
